MODERN TRENDS IN ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING

As is known, foreign language knowledge is an essential component of interpersonal communication, necessary for successful international and intercultural contacts. The growth of the internet and social meadia allowed teachers of English from all over the world to form online communities that act like a huge global staffroom [1].

One of the most efficient ways to invite visitors into classrooms is Video conferencing which enables learners to collaborate with each other at distance via Skype, iChat and FaceTime or Flash Meeting and similar tools. In certain situations this can be one of the few methods available for exposing learners to native English speakers and for facilitating cultural exchanges [2, p.25]. It is stated that Video conferencing can also bring specialist English teachers into classrooms for direct teaching as well as modelling good practice for the mainstream teacher. Teachers themselves can also link up using the technology for more in-depth teacher training sessions[2, p.25].

The growth of quantity and quality of information on the internet made learning to move gradually from a teacher-centred top-down approach to a student-centred, bottom-up one over the last years [1]. Thus, the teacher has become a consultant, guide, coach, and/or facilitator, rather than a knowledge-transmitter, which will help students ti think and reflect and enable teachers and learners to make any innovation work according to our needs.
